NOTES AND OBSERVATIONS FROM LIBRARY DIRECTOR GREG NEEDHAM

As spring 2014 unfolds, there is a lot of excitement at the library! The spring puppet show was "The Three Little Pigs," and I managed to catch one of the last showings. The children, their families, and caregivers had a wonderful time rooting (I couldn't resist the pun) for the pig brothers, and I think everyone was glad to see that the ending included the wolf learning a valuable lesson. Later in this edition of The Bookmark, you will learn about the wonderful programs we are offering for May. The summer reading program is shaping up to be truly memorable as well. A lot of work goes into planning all of the programs and bringing them to reality, and we love to see the results for our patrons!


Much work is ongoing behind the scenes that is starting to show on the surface. We continue to upgrade the lighting at the main library, so lighting levels are what they should be throughout the library, and with increased efficiency we will be able to spend less on electricity and more on books, other materials, and services for our patrons. Already the lighting change in the adult nonfiction area beneath the mezzanine is complete. That area is brighter rather than dim, and soon the local history room will see the same upgrade. Also the Square (which lets us take debit and credit card payments) went live at the main library in April, and will go to all of our other locations soon. Sheppard Memorial Library opened to the public in August 1930, and in April 2014 we began accepting debit and credit card payments! The library has been here through changes in society, economy, and technology. We strive to adapt to always have the best possible positive impact for the people we serve.

Also, we have been implementing a large grant project this year that will bring RFID (radio frequency identification), which we already have at the main library, to each of the branch locations. This \$100,000 grant is made possible


through funding from the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) under the provisions of the Library Services and Technology Act as administered by the State Library of North Carolina, a division of the Department of Cultural Resources. Once again the matching funds for this grant were provided by the terrific Friends of the Sheppard Memorial Library, so there was no funding burden whatsoever for local government! Soon, guicker checkout and the option of self-checkout will be a reality at the Winterville, Carver, and East branches, which will free up staff to provide other assistance for patrons. Inventory work made possible by the new technology will result in a cleaner and updated collection of books and other materials with a more-accurate catalog. Finally, security gates at the Winterville, Carver, and East branches will help to make sure materials don't go out the doors if they aren't checked out (just like at the main library).

As you can imagine, the library staff have really had to step up to the challenge of increased programming, facilities upgrades, and implementation of advanced technology. I can tell you that they have taken on the extra work with great positive attitudes, knowing what the improvements mean for all of us, patrons and staff alike. The result of all of this hard work will be more-efficient library service for our wonderful community. We have been collecting patron feedback to help us make the best improvements, and we have conducted several surveys since January. There is one more survey that is now live, and that should be the last one for a while. If you a public library computer user, please www.sheppardlibrary.org and complete the Impact Survey to help us understand what computer services we need to offer, and so we can best plan for computer replacements. Thanks to everyone who completed one or more of the surveys. We also thank you for spreading the word about what the library has to offer, and for letting our elected officials know what the library means to you and our community!







June 9 – August 1

Be a super scientist this summer! Join the summer reading program, "Fizz, Boom, Read," to experiment and discover!

Children will explore many areas of science this summer as they read and attend story hours. The story hours and special events may catalyze children's knowledge of levers, wedges and other machines, how our senses work, chemistry of burps, the wonders of water, or the sound of music.
