NOTES AND OBSERVATIONS FROM LIBRARY DIRECTOR GREG NEEDHAM

As September progresses, our IT department has been removing the old public computers from the main library technology center and replacing them with new ones. Our first priority in this project is the new computer lab itself, which is located in the central technology area between the reference and circulation departments. This is also the "quiet computer area," where talking and cell phones are not permitted. In addition to the public computer workstations being installed there, we will have an instructor's station set up to include a large screen TV on a rolling cart, plus an instructor's laptop to use in teaching the classes. Once the lab installation is completed and tested, we will begin registering people for the very first free basic computer skills class. We are very excited about our partnership with the Literacy Volunteers of Pitt County, who will provide instructors for computer classes in the lab. We are also planning some other classes, to be conducted by library staff. These may cover a range of topics including using the library catalog, virtual tours of library resources, and how to use NCLIVE to access online newspapers, magazines, and journals. Stay tuned for more information on the new lab and instructional offerings. We have come a long way since the 1990s! In 1996, the main library offered three computer workstations (shown in the photo below) to the public for searching the new "World Wide Web." The Sheppard Memorial Library system now offers over 100 computer workstations for public use, which see over a guarter million uses per year.




WINTERVILLE LIBRARY UPDATE


I am delighted to report that the Winterville Town Council, acting on a motion by council member Veronica Roberson, restored full funding for the Winterville Library through the remainder of this fiscal year, which ends June 30th. We are extremely grateful to all of the council members for this decision. If the 40% funding reduction had remained in place, beginning October 1st the Winterville Library would have had to be closed for half of the current operating hours and their book budget would have been cut in half! We also appreciate the Winterville residents who contacted their elected officials and shared what the library means to them. Going forward, Sheppard Memorial Library will continue to honor and work to strengthen the partnership with the Town of Winterville that has made excellent library service a reality for the Winterville community for nearly 25 years. It has now been a decade since the beautiful new Winterville Library opened its doors, and the coming decade will hold all kinds of exciting improvements in library service. We are glad that Winterville will be with us to experience the benefits of cutting edge library service into the future!


